AGM and visit to the Father Willis organ



Our June meeting will begin with our short Annual Meeting where we shall hear reports from our officers and elect the committee for 2025-2026. We shall then see, hear and play the Historic Grade 1 Father Willis organ. The organ was installed in 1860 in the West Gallery (II/25) and in 1881 it was moved to its current location in the southeast chamber. In 1888 the Choir Organ was added (all by Willis). In 1926 and again in 1948 the Willis firm overhauled the organ and in 1977 Rushworth and Dreaper cleaned and overhauled the instrument. NPOR: R01983

Llanfairfechan, Saturday May17th 2025

Around fourteen members met for lunch in the Beach Pavillion Café on the shore at Llanfairfechan. It was a glorious warm day (though there was a cooling breeze from the sea), more like the day we might hope for at the height of summer than in mid spring. The options for lunch were very good and everyone seemed pleased with what they chose to eat. (I suspect a few of us will be returning there on our next trip to that part of the north Wales coast.)





After lunch we made our way to St Mary and Christ Church in the town where we met with other members of the Association. Apparently "Llanfairfechan" means "little church of St Mary". The old St Mary's Parish Church was built on the site of an earlier church in 1849. This church closed in 1999 and the historic dedication to St Mary transfer



to Christ Church. Christ Church is a Grade II listed building and was built in 1864, the construction being funded by landowner John Platt(1817-1872) of Bryn y Neuadd Hall.

The fine Hill organ dates in its present form from 1902. The NPOR (NPOR: N116991) records the genesis of the instrument as a two manual organ in 1876, with the choir organ added in 1892 and additional work in 1894 and 1902. Other than cleaning, maintenance and repairs, there has been no major work on the organ. The instrument was awarded a Historic Organ Certificate Grade 1 by BIOS in 2010. The organ is generally in good order, though some problems caused by water ingress from a leaking roof is now receiving some attention.



Our visit to the church began with Eric Newbound, the organist, welcoming us and telling us about the organ. Eric then played the Bach G major Vivaldi Concerto (BWV 592) and Alexandre Guilmant's "March on Handel's Lift up your heads". These pieces, beautifully played, showed off the varied sounds of the organ - quite outstanding from only 38 speaking stops.

Eric invited members to try the organ for themselves. We heard many different pieces played on this fine organ; it was wonderful to hear such a wide range of music on this great instrument. Everyone who played really enjoyed the experience – the instrument was very responsive (Hill's patented supply pneumatic action was still working well).





This was a wonderful meeting – a great welcome, a very fine organ, good weather, an enjoyable lunch and good conversation and fellowship with other members of the Association. Thanks to Eric for hosting us and to John and Katriona who put the day together.

John's for one of their "Songs of Praise" services. He has sent us some photographs of this little organ. The NPOR says this chamber organ was possibly built around 1840 by Richard Jackson (Bolton/Liverpool) and restored in 1984 by Whiteley of Chester. (NPOR: H00008). The manual compass is 54 notes from low C and the 13 note pedal board begins at G. There are five stops: Stop (sic) Diapason 8; Keraulophon 8 (replacing original Open Diapason); Principal 4; Flute 4; Fifteenth 2.



These pedals might be a challenge to play!
Remember the bottom note is G not C.



Book review: In search of nightingales

In 1927 Elizabeth Campbell returned home to Melbourne, Australia, broken-hearted at leaving England after attending the Royal College of Music in London under the expert guidance of Dr. Henry Ley, doyen of organ masters at both the RCM and Eton College. During her studies she made many friends and travelled extensively. In May 1933, by now a celebrated church organist and choir mistress, Elizabeth makes her long-awaited return as part of the RCM's Jubilee celebrations and records each day of her year's stay in four notebooks. In them she paints a unique portrait of London and England's people, towns and countryside between the wars



and still in the grip of the Great Depression. Seen through the eyes of not just a visitor but a passionate observer wholly enamoured with their subject, she presents an intimate social history that leaves the reader feeling they've lived every moment. Her diary notebooks, all marked 'Strictly Private', were saved from Cyclone Tracy's destruction of Darwin (Christmas Eve 1974) by her great niece, Rosalind Hartshorn, who thankfully has decided to share her beloved Great Aunt Betha's fascinating observations before they remained hidden forever.

Curtis Rogers wrote in The Organ Magazine: "She writes with such an enthusiasm, and her descriptions are delightful. As a picture of life in another age it is perfect."

Julia Aries, Archivist, Glyndebourne Opera Festival wrote: "...The personal and sentimental value of such a diary is perfectly palpable as a record of London (and to some extent English) life in the 1930s. It is certainly a joy to read and Campbell's humanity and gentleness is evident on virtually every page."

Copies are available from various booksellers including The Great British Bookshop. An e-book version is available for the Kindle.
